# MR. NNC IN 1993



# Making What Marriott Is Today


"People around here look down on Marriott workers," notes sophomore Jon MacDonald, who was employed in NNC's cafeteria during spring term. "It really doesn't bother me though."

Indeed, food service isn't exactly a glamorous job. However, for more than a few students, putting in time at Marriott means the benefit of extra cash without the inconvenience of leaving campus. Conflicting work and class schedules are avoided. Additionally, at about ten hours per week, students who are employed in food service are able to work fewer hours than those who hold off-campus part-time jobs.


Most Marriott workers have more realistic expectations of college food than the average student, understanding the difficlulties involved in serving three meals a day to approximately seven hundred on-campus students. "They have a limited budget--they could use better equipment, bigger ovens," according to one food service employee. However, Marriott does often use name brand foods, and offers a variety of entrees, including vegetarian. This year Marriott implemented a pasta and wok bar in addition to the sideline and salad bar.

Granted, cafeteria food will never be quite the same as the meals most of us ate at home. But considering the magnitude of their task, Marriott workers are doing a pretty impressive job. *by Diane Donica* 



Surrounded by a lake, a creek, and a mountainous region, they made the great outdoors their playground. Except for planned devotions, the retreat was mainly non-structured to allow everyone to relax in their own style. They could go hiking, play volleyball, football, softball, frisbee, and go canoeing. Several folks even brought their mountain bikes to challenge the rugged terrain.

Along with devotions, the junior class brought in Cab Benefield, former youth director at Denver First Church, to boost the spiritual growth in God's country. Benefield, now a memeber of Deerflat Free Methodist Church, spoke to the students about the "real world," and how to be successful in it without compromising their Christianity.




So while he endeavors to hitch his wagon to a star and sail to more expansive frontiers, his parents may be wondering when, if ever, he will settle down.



# We asked

## graduating seniors

about their chances of securing a job in the "real world." We were surprised by the responses some gave us. In a decade in which most Americans are worried about the nation's financial situation and their own personal jobs, 61% of seniors interviewed felt they were ready to tackle the Real World, most confident that they can start a career with the skills they have gained through their college experience at NNC.

Although it would appear idealistic on the surface, many of these seniors really believe that they have received equitable training in their field of study, and that the school's reputation in the northwest will further aid the job search in landing a good job.

There was some skepticism, however, about entering the job market. Another 26% felt uncertain, even wary, about their chances. Some pointed to a slowly improving economy and employer reluctance to hire new people as reasons for their ambivalence.

Despite this doubtful group, another 10% felt unsure about getting a job in their field, but also believed that more education was the key to improving their chances. One senior, who asked to remain anonymous, offered this thought: "In this day and age, you can't make it in the Real World anymore with just your good looks and a bachelor's degree. You almost need a Master's to ensure you of a job. I guess those are the times, though."

Finally, we encountered a small group of folks who seemed just scared listless about the prospect of going out in the Real World. Some of their fears were unwarranted, others outright ridiculous. These seniors will probably be back next year and register as "professional students."

# "We're just like FAMILY"

Over the span of four years in college, students have a tendency to form close friendships with a select group of people. This is a story about such a group of friends. They are the Tao Pao, or The Mosh girls, and they're a dying breed.

It all started with the game of basketball--intramural basketball, to be precise. Graduating seniors Kona Lew and Lee Ann Yarborough decided that they wanted to form an intramural team to play in women's league basketball. They knew they weren't any good and none of them were particularly competitive. The fact is: they just wanted to have fun.














# Who's Who



His tender voice warmly greeted the graduating class of 1993. Dr. Jim Diehl, the Colorado District Superintendent and Chairman of the Board of Regents, shared some words of wisdom that he had written in the back of his Bible over the years and advised the graduates on some life lessons.

The Baccalaureate Service is a religious ceremony in which students are

entrusted with the commission of carrying forth their knowledge and understanding to help society and aid a dying world. During this service, the sacred *hooding ceremony* took place, wherein members of the faculty place a decorative hood over the graduating senior and accept them into the fellowship of scholars. It was a symbolic moment for each graduate, and because of this special rite of passage Dr. Lilburn Wesche, in-

terim Academic Dean, requested that no pictures be taken while the hoods were being placed.

The hooding doctors of the Bachelor of Arts/Science degrees were Raymond Cooke, C.S. Cowles, Keith Drahn, Gary Ganske, Martha Hopkins, Walden Hughes, Lynn Neil, Karen Vehlow, Kenneth Watson, and James Willis. Drs. Wendell Bowes, Dennis Cartwright, Michael Lodahl, Paul Miller, Dennis Waller and Randall Simmons hooded the Master of Education/Ministry graduates.

Fourth, Diehl challenged graduat set their sights high, to dream the big dr


"What would your goals be it knew you couldn't fail?" he a the hopeful crowd.

mentioned previously] will be added you."



# FORD REPLACES DOANE AS PRESIDENT

What do you do when you lose a great leader? You replace him with an equally competent and distinguished leader. This scenario was played out after Dr. Leon Doane died in April, having served as NNC President for just over six months, and was replaced by Dr. Gilbert Ford.

Doane had made in-roads among all facets of the campus community and it seemed that he

would be the person to unify all branches of an otherwise wild tree. Although pessimism followed his death, all shadows seemed to disappear

when Regent chairperson Dr. Jim Diehl announced that Dr. Ford would serve as interim President until the executive search committee could review more candidates.

An emergency measure turned into a blessing.

Ford has been at the school since 1950, served as the founder of NNC's physics program, Academic Dean, and was honored as Professor of the Year in 1992. He even had the yearbook dedicated to him in 1991. Ford has the clout to serve as President. But, at least from the student perspective, he fits into the same mold as Doane did: he was not a pastor, but he is a strong Christian layperson; he was not a politician, but he is concerned about Christian higher education and is an educator himself. His witness is his quiet, constant walk with the Lord.

Ford was also appealing to the Regents be-

cause he will be retiring from fulltime teaching next year, making him available for other jobs. He

seemed the right person to fill Doane's shoes, and he emerged at the right time.

The Regents were mostly concerned about having a President by Graduation Day, so that he could administer the conferring of degrees. What better person than the professor who epitomizes the academia at NNC! For whatever reasons they selected him the Regents received the students' vote of approval.

# BRIDGING THE GAP OVER THE MEAL PLAN

It was right there in black and white--all it took was a calculator and some reasoning. But still, students reacted with shock when they read the October 13 edition of the *Crusader*, which ran an article about students being left out in the cold with the new meal plans.

The issue was this: Dr. Ken Hills, dean of students, had promoted a new, more flexible

meal plan. In the past, students had complained that they were losing meals every Tuesday with the stream-lined 10-14-19 meal plan. So he

got together with Dick White, Marriott food service manager, and Hal Weber, VP of Financial Affairs, and devised a new plan, offering the flexibility to maintain a set number of meals throughout the term. Billed as the 10-14-19 block plan, students believed they were getting the same amount of meals per week as the traditional meal plan, but with the added feature of having unused meals roll over throughout the term. However, Hills, Weber, and White had averaged the number of meals students used on the standard 10-14-19 plan. There were fewer meals with the block plan. But many students failed to divide the number of meals they were receiving with this plan by the number of weeks in the term. At their rate of consumption, senior *Crusader* writer Angela Plies reported, "most students will have cold turkey for Thanksgiving" (the expected exhaustion point for those on the block plan).

Students flocked to Hills' office for an explanation. Again, he got together with Weber and White, and they presented all the facts to the student in a symposium. Several positive things

resulted from this town meeting: first, students received the answers they craved; second,

students were empowered to offer alternatives and improvements to the system; third, Hills demonstrated his brand of openness again to student opinion.

"We do not have a solution. We do have options in mind. Student input can influence that," commented Hills.

Students were allowed to upgrade their meal plans with no penalty, reminding them that the administration is here *for* the students, not *against* them. Before Hills arrived from Point Loma nearly six or seven years ago, there was only a standardized one-level meal--everybody ate 19 meals a week. The wrinkles will be worked out in time, and the students will be the beneficiaries of innovation and change.



# TAKING IT TO HEART: REACTING TO EVALUATIONS

In his one-year mission as interim Academic Dean, Dr. Lilburn Wesche strived for uniformity in the student evaluation methods of professors and revision of the curriculum. He took steps in the right direction.

If the objective of students at a Christian liberal arts college is to learn, then the objective of its professors is to teach. Wesche, an educator himself and former chair of the education department

and graduate studies program, included students in the evaluation and curriculum review processes to added in-

took an inch and went a mile.

The evaluation process seemed slanted, according to Wesche, who sought to weed out ineffective professors and improve the overall instruction happening in the classroom. "By uniforming the evaluations," he said, "professors will have a better idea of their strengths and deficiencies, and where they will need to improve. Hopefully, they will

take the evaluations to heart."

From a student perspective, it seemed that Wesche was trying to better an already fine faculty. But some professors reacted negatively to the process. But they responded positively to the student report to the curriculum review committee. Co-chairs Rosco Williamson and Wendy White, senior, put together "one of the most thorough evaluations of the curriculum I've ever heard," according to Wesche. Interview-

> ing a wide range of students from various fields of study, the student panel managed to find strengths and weaknesses in every

put. He was surprised when particular students facet of the academic realm. Their suggestions appeared as the first step in the curriculum revision process and gave division and department chairs a starting point in their own process.

Besides his in-class presence, Swanson also guides music in chapel on Wednesday worship time. His addition to the faculty has been a positive one--both in energy and witness.





teaching tandems tour the world sabbatical

From time to time, they need a break to regroup and refine. When professors travel on sabbatical, they often times serve as teaching fellows at other schools, while they consume all they can view, read, study, or experience on their spare time. NNC's teaching tandems--the Bennetts, the Neils, and the Willises--traveled to the four corners of the world to refresh their lives with time away from the NNC's ivy towers and exposure to a new world of ideas.

Dr. Gaymon Bennett and his wife, Evelyn, traveled to jolly old England to trace the writings of our founding fathers, the Pilgrims. "I

wanted to find some Anglo and American connections of some sort," said Bennett. "The Pilgrims didn't leave much of a trail

behind them, quite intentionally." He studied the sociological, economical, and religious implications of the Middle Ages in England and their impact on the fledgling colonies in the New World. One of the biggest thrills for him was his visit to Cambridge University. Bennett had been given special privilege to file through the archive library. The Bennetts' Christmas jaunt was made possible in part by the Faculty and Academic Program Enhancement Fund, which is endowed by Dr. and Mrs. Ken Watson.

Drs. Ralph and Lynn Neil went globetrotting to Australia and Papua New Guinea. They spent most of their time teaching at the Australia-New Zealand Nazarene Bible College in Brisbane, where they taught a wide range of subjects-theology, Biblical literature, discipleship, English and speech. Dr. Lynn read and prepared a workshop dealing with the implementation of writing across the curriculum program. Dr. Ralph studied the diversity in ministerial training in order to help train future ministers and missionaries. He visited different Nazarene churches, Bible colleges, and extension classes; he also interviewed pastors, educators, and missionaries.

"Our sabbatical leave," said Dr. Ralph, "has provided the opportunity to bring together our desire to grow professionally as college professors and our desire to be of help in world

> evangelization." The Board of Regents assisted in making their sabbatical possible.

JoAnne Willis also visited two world areas, examining Native American culture and purusing classical European culture. It as unique for these professors to blend their fields of study while on this sabbatical. Both Willises studied music and art--Dr. Jim for its historical and aesthetic value, Dr. JoAnne for its therapeutic value. They attended a conference on emotional growth and creativity in adult life, which Dr. JoAnne said would an immediate impact in her psychological development courses. Then they traveled to Europe and toured the major galleries and landmarks. They visited cathedrals and galleries of Paris, experienced the Berlin Wall, and absorbed the magnificence of Leonardo's The Last Supper. Dr. Jim intimated that sabbaticals are necessary to get a broader view oflife.

lems, made the speed of travel slow.



### **REMEMBER THE GOOD TIMES.**


