Professor Lown plays several instruments. Included in these are: the piano, organ, trumpet, guitar, harmonica, and accordion. While at Cambridge, Mr. Lown began his traveling experiences and traveled extensively over Western and Eastern Europe during vacation periods. Languages are a very important part of Professor Lown's studies. He is fluent in Latin, French, Greek, German, and Hebrew. Along with these he also reads Italian, Spanish, and Portugese.
