ALFRED COOKMAN was a man of great spiritual charm. At the time of his funeral Bishop Foster said that he was the most sacred man he had ever known. At ten years of age he was clearly converted, and under the direction of Bishop and Mrs. Hamline he was led to seek the experience of entire sanctification. After he had sought for two days, God gave him the Holy Spirit in sanctifying power. He testified: "The great work of sanctification that I had so often prayed and hoped for was wrought in me—even in me. I could not doubt it. The evidence in my case was as direct and indubitable as the witness of sonship received at the time of my adoption into the family of heaven. Oh, it was glorious, divinely glorious.

"Need I say that the experience of sanctification inaugurated a new epoch in my religious life? Oh, what blessed rest in Jesus, what an abiding experience of purity through the blood of the Lamb, what a conscious union and constant communion with God, what increased power to do or suffer the will of my Father in heaven, what delight in the Master's service, what fear to grieve the infinitely holy Spirit, what love for, and desire to be with, the entirely sanctified, what confidence in prayer, what illumination in the perusal of the sacred Word, what increased unction in the performance of public duties!"

This was his testimony until he went sweeping through the gates, washed in the blood of the Lamb.

There are many blessings to be received by group praying. Perhaps some suggestions on how to start a prayer group would be helpful.

- 1. For a prayer group that is to continue weekly, best attendance and results will usually be obtained if there is some natural tie among the members of the group. Thus, it may be housewives in a neighborhood, a Sunday-school class, businessmen on the way to work, a factory or office group at noon, a missionary society, Christian young people in a high school or college, Sunday-school teachers, the men of a church, the pastors in a city, elderly members, or a young people's society.
- 2. The group may meet in homes, the church, or a shop or office, as may be most convenient.
- 3. Meetings should be held weekly, at any suitable time. For example, housewives would probably meet about nine-thirty or ten in the morning, a high school group after school, a young people's society on Sunday afternoon, a group of men on Saturday night, Sunday-school teachers early Sunday morning, a group of pastors on Monday morning.
- 4. Prayer groups should be kept small. Usually it is best to divide the group whenever there are more than twelve. Of course there may be more than twelve in some groups, but an attendance of ten or twelve each week. However, if at all possible, nearly all members of the group should be present each meeting.

## The Sound in the Mulberry Trees

TODAY'S world presents a dark picture! Drunkenness, reveling, moral degeneration, broken homes, juvenile delinquency, disregard for life and property, and heinous crime are in our land. Fear, distrust, hatred, and greed spawn their blight in the councils of nations. Godless communism seeks to submerge the world, and the threat of total annihilation faces civilization.

And yet, notwithstanding all this, there is more to encourage the people of God now than there has been in two generations.

First, mass evangelism is reappearing in our own and other countries, with a forceful impact. Furthermore, strong efforts are being made to integrate the converts of such great campaigns with the established churches in their areas. Notable among such revivals was the Billy Graham campaign of 1954 in London. A year later, statistics indicate that a gratifying percentage of those who went forward in this meeting are still professing Christians, active in their own religious groups. It is well to remind ourselves that Jesus himself employed this method, getting the gospel, on one occasion, to five thousand men, beside women and children, in a single service.

Second, church attendance and membership is on the increase. In the United States, church membership is near eighty-five million, with six out of every ten persons a church member; and this revived interest in God and the church is found among people of every occupation and social standing.

Third, this increased interest in churchgoing has launched a large-scale church-building program. It is particularly heartening that hundreds of these new churches are going up in or near housing developments. Along with the shopping center and the modern grade school, the church is taking its place in these new communities. It is also encouraging to note that the type of architecture generally employed is inviting. Instead of extravagant and repelling edifices, the new church building seems to extend its welcome to the entire family unit, offering Sabbath worship and wholesome weekday activity for all.

Fourth, it follows logically that the enrollment in divinity schools and preacher-training institutions is the highest in our national history.

Fifth, close on the heels of these advances has been the greatest emphasis upon house-to-house visitation and personal witnessing that evangelical Christianity has had since the days of the apostles. This, together with an intensive religious education program, aims not only to reach the unchurched, but to give individual attention, particularly to children and young adults, seek-

ing to establish them in the essentials of the Christian faith.

Sixth, secular education is feeling the upsurge of religious interest. On college and university campuses spontaneous groups are gathering for prayer and Bible study and the asking and answering of religious questions. Furthermore, the trend, particularly as regards the truth of God's Word, shows a wholesome reversal from the position assumed by educators a quarter of a century ago. The daily press related recently that, at a "Religious Focus" week in one of our Midwestern colleges, a visiting professor of science stated that several years ago science was willing to dispute events in the Bible story. "Now," he was quoted as saying, "the Bible has become a remarkable book of science. And as for the miracles," he continued, "it seems likely that a miracle is an event happening in perfect accord with physical laws, but governed by laws we do not understand. If we are to accept God as the Creator," he added, "we must admit that He not only understands these laws, but governs them." For some of us who struggled up through an educational system permeated with evolutionistic materialism, this sounds like a hopeful word from a present-day scientist.

Seventh, as always is the case at times of spiritual awakening, strong laymen's movements are being felt. On February 2 in our nation's capital, nine hundred persons attended a "Prayer Breakfast," the third in an annual series at which Conrad Hilton, the hotel operator, picks up the check. Vice-President Nixon read the scriptures, and members of Congress, among other notables, were in attendance. On Wednesday morning of each week, approximately seventeen senators attend a prayer service in the capital; while approximately sixty-five representatives hold a similar prayer session on Thursday mornings.

The laymen's group known as "Alcoholics Anonymous" is making a heroic effort to combat chronic drunkenness. The steps in their creed—confession, repentance, public testimony, group fellowship, and prayer—sound like orthodox Nazarene doctrine.

Other examples of a religious upsurging are the American Legion's "Back to God" program, and "Operation Pray," sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and responsible for the suggested prayers to be offered before meals, found in numerous public eating places.

Eighth, no greater indication of a new interest in things spiritual and religious can be found than that evidenced by the press, in the books,

periodicals, and newspapers of today. Many large newspapers and magazines feature a regular religious column or section. More is being written about prayer in these sources than has appeared in a lifetime. A recent advertisement for a current magazine was captioned "Our Prayers Could Change the World." Such basis for appeal by circulation managers is heartening! In *Time* magazine's recent listing of six nonfiction best-sellers, five were religious books. The sale of the Bible itself, and of devotional handbooks, is at an all-time high.

Ninth, deeply significant is the position taken toward religion by the President of the United States. Ever since, on the day of his inauguration, he hushed waiting millions by "my little prayer," there has been a growing sense of the leadership of God in our nation. The President's regular attendance at church has witnessed to the power and meaning of spiritual values to him; every cabinet meeting opens with a time of prayer, silent or expressed.

Now, religious scholars are taking a serious and sometimes a dubious look at these signs of a "religious revival" in America. Some of it, they say, is spurious, that it is primarily motivated by individual selfishness, that it will not accomplish its purpose unless it be based upon genuine repentance and self-dedication.

It is timely to remind ourselves that when Paul in his day received the complaint that some were preaching Christ not sincerely, he replied, "What then? notwithstanding, every way, whether in pretence, or in truth, Christ is preached; and I therein do rejoice, yea, and will rejoice." And, furthermore,

Tenth, in the very fear and warning being sounded by the churchmen of our day there is tangible evidence that God is trying to get to us. For, too many times in recent decades, recognized religionists have been blind leaders of the

blind, having a form of godliness but denying the power thereof. Because the leaders of this people caused them to err; because, in too many instances they offered an anemic, devitalized, compromising substitute for genuine salvation and a change of heart and life, and did not point to "the old paths, where is the good way," men turned from religion and became lost in the maze of their own godless wanderings.

Now the age-old hunger of the heart for God is again asserting itself. Is it not encouraging that from pulpit and theological school, in the press and over the air, from leaders of all faiths, is sounding a new and a rugged note of warning that religion be not merely a vogue? Churchmen are proclaiming that Christianity means a cross, that Christ's theme was not "Relax, have confidence"; it was "Repent!" They are declaring that "getting things from God" is not the ultimate purpose of prayer, but rather, self-dedication; that the "In God We Trust" postage stamps and the addition "under God" to the flag salute should not make us smug, but humble. When religious leaders are crying out against superficiality, are reviving the Biblical standards of obedience to God's commandments and salvation from sin, it is a token of good.

Now, what should be our attitude as Nazarenes toward these things? Some, in viewing the sin and wickedness of our day, have answered the question, "If the foundations be destroyed, what can the righteous do?" with the lugubrious assertion (by their actions, if not by their lips), "Very little, very little can we do!"

But this was not David's reply when "the wicked bend their bow, they make ready their arrow upon the string, that they may privily shoot at the upright in heart." No! Then he cried, This is no time to shirk responsibility—"In the Lord put I my trust: how say ye to my soul, Flee as a bird to your mountain? ... Upon the wicked he shall rain snares, fire and brimstone, and an horrible tempest: . . For the righteous Lord loveth righteousness; his countenance doth behold the upright."

It is a time for faith, and a time for action. Never in our lifetime was it so easy to approach men and women on the matter of their personal salvation. All about us are hungry, searching hearts, acknowledging their hunger and confessing their need.

When the hosts of wickedness were arrayed against King David, and came up again and yet again, God's word to him was: "Fetch a compass behind them, and come upon them over against the mulberry trees. And . . . when thou hearest the sound of a going in the tops of the mulberry trees, that then thou shalt bestir thyself."

Nazarenes, do you not hear and see in the mulberry trees a going? God grant we may bestir ourselves and take advantage of this, our day of opportunity.



What is our greatest need today? If we were to try to express it in just one word, the answer might well be, "Pentecost." Whether the church is engaged in saving the lost or in building up believers in the faith, we cannot succeed without the Holy Spirit.

### IT COSTS SOMETHING

### To Save the Lost!

UTTERLY inseparable are the spirit of Easter morning and the challenge of the Great Commission. Oh, the urgency of world evangelism! Reaching the unreached, touching the untouched—that was the passion on the heart of Jesus. That passion drove Him to the cross. That passion drove the best of our youth through the centuries to deny themselves of the comforts of home and the luxuries of normal life to go forth to duty, sickness, pain, discomfort, and premature death. That is the passion that must grip us or we are not Christian.

It costs something to save the lost. And if more Christians had been more desperate and more missionary-hearted, millions would have been saved that were never saved. If more penitential tears would have flowed, more knees would have bent; more black, brown, yellow faces would this day be turned skyward in adoration and

praise to Jesus. We must fast and pray until the Holy Ghost drives us into more devotion and self-denial. We must be more missionary-minded!

It costs something to save the lost. It is not an easy, rocking-chair, effortless, jellyfish job to save lost men from sin and hell. Somebody has to pay a price. Lord, let it be I! I want to do something. I want to give something. I want to let go of something, so I can cling to lost souls and pull them out of the fire. Lord, empty both my hands, so I can snatch them. Tear these cumbrances from my feet, so I can run to them. Unload this tongue of its weary burden of nonessentials and let it be free to warn them. I must cry and call and shout and plead. I must get their attention. O God, give me a passion for the lost.

It costs something to save the lost. The missionaries have made their willing sacrifice. They were young. They were intelligent. They were highly trained. They could have settled down here in the homeland, earned good money, held responsible positions, owned beautiful cars, homes, and appliances. They could have had luxuries and comforts and could have taken their "ease in Zion," but they did not do that.

They went out. They took the trails, forded the streams, climbed the mountains in the burning sun. They rode oxcarts, donkey backs, climbed rough trails on foot, waded the rivers, dragging their weary loads behind them. They piled up medicines and Bibles and carried them on their shoulders. They made no money; they feathered no nest in the world for their comfort, but they carved the name of Jesus down through the heavy timbers and left trails for others to follow. They endured sickness, fever, deprivations, exposure, persecution, and many of them broke prematurely in health and dropped into silent graves, but their converts picked up the banner of self-denial and pressed on. They paid a price magnificent and convinced the world that it costs something to save the heathen.

The children of the missionaries also have paid a price to save the heathen. Those little children began paying the price as soon as they were brought into the world. They are exposed to diseases, dangers, and deprivations from which our children in America are protected. Many times at the tender age of eleven they have to go hundreds of miles away from their parents to boarding schools. Don't think those little children do not soak the pillows through the dreary midnights. Do not think it is the easy thing to be snatched out of home and thrown among strangers. Yes, these little swollen eyes and breaking hearts will cry out of the darkness if you will listen. They will tell you that it costs something to save men and women for heaven.

It costs something to save the lost. It cost Jesus something. Look, if you can bear it—see yonder dusty mountain—three crosses there against the stormy sky line. Ah, there is my Jesus, hanging limp and naked. The crown of thorns is rammed

upon His brow. Those thorns have torn their way through the flesh of His forehead and the blood streaks down across His lovely face and drips off the end of His beard. Listen—you will hear strange words, "Father, forgive them." Take off thy shoes and draw near this spot so hallowed. Make bare—smite on thy breast—fall in the dust at His feet, and then agree with me that it has cost something to save the heathen.

But this is Easter morning. History, ancient and medieval, is in the dim yesterdays. We live in a new world, facing a new generation of lost humanity. We might as well face it; it is going to cost us something to save the masses. The nations are hungry; the message is ready to give them; young people, trained, talented, consecrated, wait in long lines, restless. Hours, days, weeks, months, and years slip by so quickly. Dare we admit having one Nazarene yet on earth whose heart is not crushed for the heathen? Calvary is looking for something from you, my brother.

Here is what you can do to strike a light in yonder gross darkness this Easter morning—this is the Easter morning challenge of the Church of the Nazarene: Let every one of us do his best. He must present a worthy Easter love offering to the Master. Do not bring cold money; pray over your offering; cry over it; consecrate it; deny yourself. I challenge you. We are not Christian until the spirit of self-denial has gripped us.

Remember, it costs something to save the lost. Every Nazarene in the world is asked to make a sacrifice this Easter morning. This is my plea, my earnest challenge, and one of my several reasons for many days of fasting and prayer.

### SANCTIFICATION—

## An Imitation or an Impartation?

A CCORDING to the words of the Master, sanctification is for a select group. In John 14:15-17 we read: "If ye love me, keep my commandments. And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever; even the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you."

In this scripture the Holy Spirit is referred to as the Comforter, and as a gift from the Father. Jesus stated that the world was not eligible for this gift, but He told the disciples that they knew Him; "for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you."

The gift of the Holy Spirit came on the Day of Pentecost as recorded in Acts 2. It is true that there is a needed preparation of hearts for His coming. Jesus said, "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst . . . for they shall be filled" (Matt. 5:6). Christ is waiting today to fill every hungry and thirsty soul with the Holy Spirit. The conditions are ever the same. There must be a complete surrender of self, and faith must be exercised to believe and receive.

The provision for our sanctification was made at Calvary, where Jesus suffered without the gate of Jerusalem to sanctify the people with His own blood. Not only has the provision been made for our cleansing, but also the will of God has been expressed in the matter. In I Thess. 4:3 we read, "This is the will of God, even your sanctification."

Every believer who has accepted Christ as his personal Saviour is encouraged and exhorted in the Scriptures to go on to perfection. The mystery of sanctification is that the perfections of Jesus Christ are imparted to us, not gradually, but instantly, when by faith we enter into the realization that Jesus Christ is made unto us sanctification.

The marvelous secret of a holy life lies, not in striving to imitate the life of Jesus, but in letting the perfections of the Master manifest themselves in our mortal bodies. The Apostle Paul declares in I Cor. 1:30, "Of him are ye in Christ Jesus, who of God is made unto us . . . sanctification."

Sanctification means the impartation of the Holy Spirit into our hearts, and when He has come to take up His abode in us, our lives will manifest the holy qualities of Jesus. We will not be striving and struggling to imitate the virtues of the Master, but by a divine act of God the heart will be cleansed from all impurity; and the Holy Spirit will manifest the love, the faith, and the holiness of Jesus through our lives. Then can we say it is not our own righteousness, but it is Christ within, "living and reigning, and saving from sin."

### The Perpetual Flame

THE FIRE on the altar of the ancient temple signified the devotion and faithfulness of the Israelites to God. This, God said, must never go out. It must be a perpetual living thing. We, as Christians, are the temple of the living God, and there is an altar of devotion within our hearts. God desires that the fire of divine love shall ever be burning intensely; it must never be permitted to go out.

Since the tendency of fire is to go out, this becomes a serious warning to every believer. Fire will not keep itself; it must be kept. There is no flame which can be kindled in either conversion or sanctification which need die; but there is no flame not in danger of dying. And there is no greater disappointment to God and man than a fireless altar in the heart of a professed Christian.

There are two ways fires go out: some are put out, others die of neglect. These different ways point to two serious dangers in the Christian life. The first is that we will be tricked by Satan into doing something—making a decision, taking a stand, embracing an attitude, cherishing a thought—that tends to put the fire out. The inspired apostle saw this danger, for he said, "Quench not the Spirit" (I Thess. 5:19). Don't put out the fire of the Holy Spirit's life within you. Don't dash water on it. Don't smother it.

That burning desire within you to testify, to speak to a friend about his soul—don't let fear or timidity squelch it. Better to speak, even if you do it poorly, than to be silenced by too much caution, and lose the fire that prompts you to speak. The fervent joy that would burn in your heart with praise and song, maybe a glad Amen or Praise the Lord—let it out! Don't smother it, lest you put out the fire. To do so is really to resist the Holy Spirit, for it is He who prompts us to pray and praise. He desires to use us and burn through us; we must let Him.


But while there is danger of putting out the fire, the greater danger is just letting it die of neglect. God not only told the Hebrews that the fire must not go out on His ancient altar; He told them how to prevent it: "and the priest shall burn wood on it every morning" (Lev. 6:12). That is a divine word for us this day. As individual priests we must replenish the wood on the altar of our hearts every morning, remembering the words of the wise man, "Where no wood is, there the fire goeth out."

What is the wood? What is the fuel that keeps our spiritual fires bright and hot? In answer, one need only ask what it was that caused the burning hearts of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. It was communion with their risen Lord. They poured out their hearts to Him; then they listened to Him talk to them. And their hearts that had been chilled by fear and despair and unbelief began to warm again. The fire was rekindled. Afterward they exclaimed: "Did not our heart burn within us, while he talked with us by the way, and while he opened to us the scriptures?" (Luke 24:32.)

If we will take time every day to let the Master talk to us too, and open to us the Scriptures, our hearts also will burn. They will burn all through the day—and the flames of love and joy will break out of our finger tips in deeds of helpfulness, out of our tongues in words of praise, out of our eyes in happiness and peace. And ours will be the steady usefulness, and God's the undimmed glory, of the perpetual flame.

## The Golden Age

Fifth article in a series of six on "The Second Coming of Christ"

And I saw an angel come down from heaven, having the key of the bottomless pit and a great chain in his hand. And he laid hold on the dragon, that old serpent, which is the Devil, and Satan, and bound him a thousand years (Rev. 20:1-2).

The word millennium simply means one thousand years. It could be properly applied to any ten centuries, but by common consent the term is applied to that thousand-year period set forth in the twentieth chapter of the Apocalypse as referred to above. The first ten verses of this chapter present a full description.

Through the centuries of time men have dreamed, sighed, longed, and talked of a Golden Age. Many leaders even to this day think they can bring in the Kingdom age by education, legislation, better social conditions, the United Nations, or other human agencies. Some think the Church will usher in the millennium. Certainly these are all wrong. Human hands and human plans cannot accomplish this supreme task. But the King of Kings and Lord of Lords can do it.

It would appear from the Scriptures that the millennium will not be a perfect age, as some have thought. It will be a transition period, a time of reconstruction and renovation, and an emergence into the eternal state. It takes time to re-establish Edenic conditions and blessedness. Says Rev. W. M. Tidwell: "The perfect state will not be attained during the millennium. This will come after the final purification of the heavens and the earth, but great strides will be made toward it."

The first act of Christ upon His return with His saints will be the dethronement of Satan. The world has tried all types of government and all of them have failed. Absolute monarchies, limited monarchies, republics, empires, dynasties, democracies, and dictatorships have failed. Man has never found a perfect form of government, nor the perfect ruler. Now, the rule of Christ, a theocracy, even though it be a forced one— "the rod of iron"—will be a perfect one, a period in which there will be no graft, political schemes, and demagoguery. The people on the earth will still be human and have sin in their hearts; they will render feigned obedience to Christ, not obedience based on faith and love-but of fear, for Christ will put down all evil. If men were allowed absolute freedom there would still be murders, wars, troubles, and awful outbreakings of sin.

The devil will be chained, seized, and cast into the bottomless pit for a thousand years. This is

not his final abode, but his prison until the close of the millennial age, when he is permitted to be loosed for "a little season." After this he will be cast into the lake of fire and for ever and ever suffer torment. It was a great day when Jesse James, the most noted outlaw of his day, was killed; it was a great day when John Dillinger, the notorious gangster, was captured by the police in Chicago; it was a great day when Al Capone, another leader and organizer of gangsterism, was confined in the federal penitentiary at Alcatraz; but the truly great jubilee hour is coming when Satan, the archenemy of God, His Son, and the whole race, is put in chains; he who for six millenniums has filled the earth with sorrow, bloodshed, heartache, distress, pain, and infinite suffering. Hail the day when he is sent to the bottomless abyss for a thousand years!

After Satan's dethronement Christ sets up His kingdom. He will rule from Jerusalem, the seat of His capital. John said: "A Lamb stood on the mount Sion." Yes, His feet will again press the very spot so sacred to history where He wept over Jerusalem. The saints will assist in the administration of His government, and righteousness and peace shall be supreme. "They shall be priests of God and of Christ, and shall reign with him a thousand years" (Rev. 20:6). There will be the coronation day and the public honoring of God's Son. Alvin York was a "hillbilly" from Tennessee. In World War I he went overseas and came back a national hero. General Pershing acclaimed him the greatest hero of World War I. When Alvin came back to America his name was on every lip. Great parades and banquets were held in his honor. Rich gifts were bestowed upon him. His picture was in every magazine and newspaper. This was a great change for the mountain lad of Tennessee, but it is nothing compared with the change given to Christ from the suffering Lamb to the Lion of the tribe of Judah as He ascends His throne while an assembled universe, angels, and re-deemed saints crown Him Lord of all.

Furthermore, when Christ returns to reign, paradise will be regained; the curse will be lifted from the animal world, vegetation, and man. Isaiah told us about those days: "The wolf also shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; and the calf and the young lion and the fatling together; and a little child shall lead them. And the cow and the bear shall feed; their young ones shall lie down together: and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. And the sucking child shall play on the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put his hand on the cockatrice' den. They shall not hurt nor destroy

in all my holy mountain: for the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea" (Isa. 11:6-9). Amos and other prophets foretold the same restored conditions.

Today we have to fight scale, blight, boll-weevil, rust, insects, caterpillars, moths, cutworms, army worms, flies, bugs, weeds, rodents, hail, droughts, tornadoes, hurricanes, lightning, as well as ferocious beasts and terrible pests of all descriptions; but someday the curse on the soil, the animal kingdom, and mankind will be taken from our midst. -The diseases that prey upon beasts, birds, and fish; the parasites, germs, and sicknesses that attack cattle, horses, sheep, and poultry; the curse that abounds everywhere, will be removed at the coming of the Lord. "The whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain" (Rom. 8:22) now, but His coming will redeem all nature and His glory will be manifest.

Also when Christ returns, human life will be greatly extended. It would be wrong to say that there will be no sickness and death in the millennium. We have a word from the prophet on this line. "There shall be no more thence an infant of days, nor an old man that hath not filled his days: for the child shall die an hundred years old; but the sinner being an hundred years old shall be accursed" (Isa. 65:20). Jamieson, Fausset, and Brown's commentary gives an illuminating comment: "This passage proves that the better age to come to earth, though much

superior to the present, will not be a perfect state; sin and death shall have place in it, (Rev. 20:7-8) but much less frequently than now."

However, life will be the length of a tree. "For as the days of a tree are the days of my people, and mine elect shall long enjoy the work of their hands" (Isa. 65:22). Think of the redwoods, the sequoias, the Douglas firs that live for centuries! They can be seen in our national parks. They have defied the storms of the centuries and have stood there in all their majesty and glory like solid granite and God-appointed sentinels. Today man's generation seems to be seventy years. "The days of our years are threescore years and ten" (Ps. 90:10). But with the coming of Christ there will be a return in longevity like the days before the Deluge.

Today death stalks on every breeze; every pond and swamp is a charnel house, exuding deadly germs; the air and water literally abound with instruments of destruction. The mosquito stings, and injects his hypodermic needle of cholera, yellow fever, malaria, and meningitis; the rat gnaws into the granary and larder and leaves behind bacilli of black plague; the filthy housefly goes from stable and garbage can to man's table, and on each foot carries deadly germs, a sufficient number to inoculate a whole family with typhoid and tuberculosis, besides poison in his bite to infect every baby in town with infantile paralysis. From cradle to grave we must wage a constant warfare against contagious diseases, germs, bacilli, poisonous plants, and body enemies of all kinds.

Science has done much to help suffering mankind; but when it conquers one disease, another manifests its ugly self to slay innocent humanity and the curse continues on. It is in evidence everywhere. But the glad day hastens when the Christ of Calvary, the Christ of the Mount of Ascension, the Christ of Mount Zion, shall reign in righteousness, glory, and power over all the earth; when thorns and thistles shall be no more; when the physical earth shall enjoy gracious blessings.

"The wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for them; and the desert shall rejoice, and blossom as the rose. It shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice even with joy and singing: the glory of Lebanon shall be given unto it, the excellency of Carmel and Sharon, they shall see the glory of the Lord, and the excellency of our God. . . . for in the wilderness shall waters break out, and streams in the desert. And the parched ground shall become a pool, and the thirsty land springs of water . . . No lion shall be there, nor any ravenous beast shall go up thereon, it shall not be found there; but the redeemed shall walk there: and the ransomed of the Lord shall return, and come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy upon their heads: they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away" (Isaiah 35).

An artist told a class of art students: "When you paint a picture of the woods or forest, always

paint a path leading out. If you do not have this path, anyone who looks at the picture will have a feeling of suffocation." Christ and the millennial reign furnish us a wonderful path that leads out from the present world conditions, the "suffocation" of our times, and into the paradise of God.

### He Went Home!

THE Parable of the Prodigal Son is perhaps the best known of all the parables. Nevertheless, I am afraid that many of us fail to get its main point. We get so taken up with other emphases that we forget the central fact, which is that this young man "went home." He decided to repent, and more than that, he put his decision into action.

We talk about how the young man demanded his share of the goods, got them all together and went into a far country, and there spent everything. At this critical moment a famine struck the land. He became so hungry that he was willing to perform the most menial tasks in order to get something to eat. He hired himself to a citizen of that country to feed hogs, but even that job didn't provide him with enough cash to satisfy his hunger. "And he would fain have filled his belly with the husks that the swine did eat"—he was still so desperately hungry.

Those are all interesting facts and a part of the parable, but no one of them is its central truth. I must move on to that stage where the young man "came to himself," and said, "How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger!" Yes, he reached the place where he saw his terrible plight as over against what he might have in his father's home. But that was not enough. I have known people who were under Holy Ghost conviction, and yet never yielded. They saw their sinfulness in all of its horribleness in contrast to the beauty and wonder of what God had for them, and still they stubbornly refused to turn from sin. They were awakened, convicted of sin, of righteousness, and even of judgment, and still did not repent.

The next verse doesn't bring us to the climax. In this the Prodigal Son says, "I will arise and go to my father, and will say unto him, Father, I have sinned against heaven, and before thee, . . . "But it is not enough to decide that you are going to the altar. It is not sufficient for you to make up your mind that you are going back to Father's

house. No, it is not enough even for you to have a certain spirit of repentance. Above everything else, if you would get anywhere with God, you must act on your decision. After you have said, "I will arise and go to my father," you must actually go.

The climax of this parable is reached in verse twenty, "And he arose, and came to his father." You can't even stop with starting; you must start and then go until you get "home." That's what it takes to be saved. The Prodigal Son went home! In that fact we have the climactic point of the Parable of the Prodigal Son.

There are those who have much to say about the father, in that while the son was yet a great way off, he had compassion on his son, "and ran, and fell on his neck, and kissed him." That is a beautiful description of the Heavenly Father's love for the sinner; but even the Father's love for the sinner isn't the important thing in salvation. Nothing that you can say about salvation can take precedence over a free moral agent's choice and his action on the basis of that choice. There will be people in hell in spite of the Father's love. The Father's love for the prodigal son is a universal truth. God loved me just as the father loved this son, and He loves you; He loves all sinners in that way, yet not all sinners are coming to Him. We live in a world where there are human beings who are free moral agents. Nothing that other men nor God can do will determine for them where they will spend eternity. Only their decision can do this. Finally, everything hinges on that.

### A Full Food Locker

WHILE traveling across one of our states some time ago, I had to stop over for a little while. During that delay I phoned a friend who lived in a community not far away. In the course of the conversation, he told me that I needed a rest and begged me to come to his place for at least a month. He explained that he had plenty of room. Also, he informed me that he had two food lockers full of food. Besides, he gave me to understand that he and his wife had plenty of time, so he would see that I had anything I wanted to eat, and absolutely nothing to do. It is needless to say that was a temptation to this preacher, but I knew very well that I couldn't possibly take that much time out from my work. I certainly would have enjoyed being with my friend and in his home. He had been kind to me many times in the past. But now I could

not even visit him for a few hours; I had to continue my journey immediately.

As I think of this offer of my friend, the twentythird psalm comes to my mind. It seems that the inspired writer was drawing the same picture for me spiritually that my friend had placed before me physically. David is saying that the Lord's spiritual food locker is brimful, ready to meet my every need, yea, my every want. Listen to what he says: "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake,' These three verses tell me that God has everything ready to meet my need in the ordinary experiences of life. He is prepared to take care of my everyday needs; yea, even my wants. He can fully supply my appetite for spiritual food. His spiritual food locker is full! "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.'

Another fact is that I can avail myself of those supplies, even though I had to turn down my friend's invitation. But this is not the whole story, for the Psalmist goes on to say, "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death. I will fear no evil: for thou art with me: thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over." Those two verses tell me that God's provisions are at hand for my extraordinary needs. When the emergencies arise, or "I walk through the valley of the shadow of death," God is able then to meet my need. Or, when my enemies press in upon me, He will prepare a table before me even while they are still at hand. My friend emphasized the abundance of his provisions for me, physically; food and rest to satisfy all my desires were offered. God goes him one better from the spiritual standpoint. In the first part of this twenty-third psalm He lets me know that He has spiritual food lockers which are full to the limit. By them He guarantees to supply, not only my regular, but also my unexpected, needs. When the cataclysm comes, when I am faced with seemingly insurmountable problems and difficulties, His provisions will be more than adequate. Are you weary and needy, my friend? Read the twentythird psalm, and revel in its promises. As you do this, remember that they are God's promises, and they never fail.

No wonder David, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, closes this beautiful psalm with these words, "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever." Again, superabundance for the needy is emphasized, with reference to the extraordinary as well as the commonplace affairs of life.

# THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL LESSON

Topic for April 17: Rehoboam, King of Judah Scripture: II Chronicles 10—13 (Printed: II Chron. 10:6-17)

GOLDEN TEXT: If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him (Jas. 1:5).

The estimate of Rehoboam's life and influence, according to the writer of the Chronicles, is certainly not high. "And he did evil, because he prepared not his heart to seek the Lord" (II Chron. 12:14). Here indeed, graphically, the grandson of David and the son of Solomon is revealed in all his weakness.

Even native weakness can be supported by the sound judgment of good advisers, but Rehoboam represents the man who seeks advice freely only until he finds support for his own designs. He did what he desired, rather than what he knew, down deep in his heart, he ought to do. It is a common temptation to take of life what we enjoy rather than what we ought. Human nature has not undergone any basic change. Real honesty is still at a high premium. God is more willing to guide us into all truth than we are to be led.

Jeroboam represented a troublesome minority that could have been profitable. In line of attack and methods, he left much to be desired. His whole carriage was a personal affront to Rehoboam. It is not the part of wisdom to take advantage of our position in meeting disagreement. In fact any truth, policy, or dogma that cannot allow for question has already defeated itself and purpose. Rehoboam does not stand alone in history as a man who was defeated because he was too proud to be held in question.

Rehoboam's ambition was to equal, if not surpass, the rule of his autocratic father. Rather than give sympathetic understanding and consideration to the human needs, he haughtily acted upon the advice of his weak counselors to rule with a rod of iron. "My little finger is thicker than my father's loins. And now, whereas my father laid upon you a heavy yoke, I will add to your yoke. My father chastised you with whips, but I will chastise you with scorpions" Chron. 10:10-11, R.S.V.). As a result, the record tells us, "There were wars between Rehoboam and Jeroboam continually." Here was a typical despot who cared nothing for the welfare of his people; hence, because

of his unbending decision, the kingdom was divided, never again to be united—a people lost forever.

Many a nation, institution, home, and cause has been divided and destroyed because of a stupid, stubborn, ruthless leader who refused to acknowledge the needs and opinions of others. May God save us from the attempt to build our little kingdoms upon narrow selfishness, personal pride, or lust for position while giving no real consideration to human needs. Sickened, we turn from history's sad picture to realize our brightest hope in the words of One who was compassionate enough to listen to the cry of the oppressed and willing to forfeit His own position to lift others-"Even as the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many" (Matt. 20:28). Rehoboam saved his life, only to lose his kingdom-Jesus gave His life and saved His kingdom. Each of us must make the choice.

## THE QUESTION BOX

Q. We speak of conversion, or being saved, as the forgiveness of our sins. We speak of entire sanctification as the eradication of inbred sin, or the sin-nature with which a person is born, and the consecration of ourselves to the will of God, whatever that will might demand. But when a person is saved, isn't there a consecration involved? If so, is this consecration of the same degree, or intensity, as that which comes with the experience of entire sanctification? If it is of the same degree, could we not then say that conversion and entire sanctification are simultaneously obtained? Personally, I believe that a person cannot consecrate

until his sins are first forgiven. Thus the experiences of conversion and entire sanctification would have to be separate.

A. You are right in your conclusion. Wesley and the holiness movement have always taught that conversion and entire sanctification are not simultaneous. Further, none of the great creeds of the Christian Church teach that a person is saved and sanctified wholly at the same time. Some of them hold that the latter can't be obtained in this life, or before death, but none of them

claim that it is received when one's sins are forgiven. Moreover, when a sinner comes to Christ, he comes with the condemnation of everlasting death upon him. He presents himself with repentance and faith, and his whole mind is filled with the thought of getting out from under the condemnation of everlasting death. This is the sinner's attitude, and God responds with forgiveness and a new life, or regeneration. When this has been accomplished, the sinner is on consecrating ground, and not one minute before. It may also be said that we do not consecrate our sins to God. They separate between us and God. Our sins are trash. God

wants our valuables, not that which is worthless. Finally, Paul says in Rom. 12:1, "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies [a part for the whole—your whole selves] a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Paul is talking to brethren, Christians, there, and not sinners.

Q. While discussing the experience of conversion and entire sanctification with an older friend, this question came up: If a person is saved and sanctified wholly and then backslides, does he have to have original sin, or carnality, cleansed from the heart? We have carnality because of inheritance from Adam. After it has been removed it seems to me that a person couldn't have carnality. Then if this is the case, the only reason for entire sanctification would be that the individual might be filled with the Holy Ghost. Maybe he wouldn't even need to be sanctified wholly because entire sanctification is being made holy, and after his sins have been forgiven, he would be holy.

A. First, we must remember that Adam's sin polluted his nature. After he sinned, he was not only a sinner, he was also sinful. Adam's nature must have been corrupted when he sinned or else we could not have inherited a sinful nature from him. If, then, Adam's sin polluted his nature, it is not illogical to believe that my sin will do the same for me. Thus, like Adam, we have acts to be forgiven and a state of nature to be cleansed. Another answer to your question is that the sinful nature which is inherited from Adam may come back upon us when we fall from holiness. As something racial, it returns to my heart when, as a part of the race, I sin again. In other words, I put myself back under the law of sin which holds for a sinful race when I backslide. When I sin, as a part of a fallen race, I forfeit my right to be free from the sinful nature which belonged to that sinful race. Third, my experience with people as a preacher for many years points to the fact that when people backslide they find themselves in the same state they were before they came to Christ the first time. This doesn't mean that I argue with any person at the altar as to what state of grace he seeks. I leave that matter with him and the Holy Spirit. If the seeker is mistaken as to what he is asking God for, the Holy Spirit will reveal that fact to him and do it far better than I could.

Q. Please explain John 19:38-43. Does the wonderful act of Nicodemus recorded in these verses indicate that he was a secret disciple of Jesus?

A. I believe that what Nicodemus did here points in the direction of his discipleship, but I don't think that it necessarily places it beyond question.

Monday:

Be sure it is winning you are doing and not merely adjusting. Keep free in spirit and adjusted to heaven, serving the Lord and not men; essentially, though not obtrusively, separate.

The beginning is love and the end is love; and your goal is getting God and men together. Keep goal and means distinct. (II Cor. 5:20.)

Tuesday:

Be sure you are winning to Christ and not merely to yourself. Risky even to think, Win to myself, that I may win to God. It is too easy to stop at a halfway house. (John 12: 24.)

Wednesday:

Be sure you live so as to be an introducer to Christ. Let them see Him through you as Transformer of lives and Strength of days. Don't let the Saviour down with your life while you recommend Him with your lips. "The world today is saying, 'Show me.'" (John 12:21.)

Be sure that your "winning" doesn't become professional. Keep always so close to Christ by prayer, by reading His Word, by careful obedience to the Spirit, that you share His concern for the lost, His compassion, His insight into human needs and human suffering. Friday:

Keep your eyes turned outward. Get acquainted with people. Learn to talk with people; better still, learn to listen. Learn—if you have to—to love people, and discover the way to let them know you care about them. Learn to be approachable. Find out how to be "different" without building a wall. The secret is love in action. (I Cor. 9:19-22.)

Saturday:

You won't win them "in bunches" or in vague generality. You will win him, then him, then him; her and her and her. Take each one individually to God in prayer and keep the prayer warm in your heart for each—before, while, and after he is won. (Matt. 4:19.)

Sunday:

Learn all you can about people by psychology, by literature, by contact; study the most approved "methods"; follow organized visitation programs. Absorb Jesus' ways of winning. Then follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Trust Him to help you find the opportunity and put the right words in your mouth at the right time. He was given to help.

young Japanese men to help us. God had answered our prayer.

The weather was warm and nearly all the missionaries had left the area, but we felt that this was God's doings and we must stay on and use the tent.

Thousands heard the gospel for the first time and scores found God in real, old-time salvation. So great were the crowds in the night services that we had to ask the children to stay away from those services, and attend only the special children's services every afternoon.

Being in a densely populated area, we needed to move the tent only about eight blocks and we would have an entirely new crowd of listeners. Pastor Haroda, two Bible students from our school in Tokyo, and I did the preaching.

Our Nagoya church is certainly growing rapidly. When it was only seven months old we had forty members, a Sunday school of over one hundred, and about sixty to ninety people in our morning worship services.—Hubert Helling.

### Religious-Emphasis Week

Addressing students of Richmond University during Religious-Emphasis

Week, Professor Eric Rust, of the Southern Baptist Seminary, said, "The Christian ministry needs preachers, not promoters. Preachers must preach the gospel before promoting buildings." Peace be with you all"? If the idea of "peace of mind" is in any sense unhealthy, the New Testament did not seem to fear it.

### **MOVED**

Recently the Church of the Nazarene moved its Headquarters from its old location at 2940 Troost Avenue to a new, commodious, and adequate quarters at 6401 The Paseo, in Kansas City, Missouri. On an adjoining tract is their new and imposing Seminary building. Eventually the Nazarenes expect to move their publishing house to a nearby tract.

### "Baby Boom!"

The current issue of Current Events makes the announcement, and it is to be considered wholesome for the nation! A baby is born in the United States every 12 seconds. There is prospect of a total population in the nation of 220 million in 1975. The same authority predicts a prospect of 4 million students enrolled in college by 1965. Life expectancy has increased in the last forty years from age 51.4 to age 68.4. Modern medicine, sanitation, health laws, and higher standard of living are given the credit. It continues: "The old get older, the poor get richer, and more people share the 357 billion national income. More security, better food, more necessities, more comforts, more fun, more opportunitiesthese alone do not add up to the good life." The truly good life grows out of "self-surrender to God."




