Ms. Judy Sadler is new to the NNC faculty this year. She is a music professor, teaching private and class voice, as well as directing Crusader Choir. She has been performing in choirs since she was in third grade.

"My first choir was in third grade, but the first time I ever performed was at a camp meeting," she said. "I knew that music was it for me. I've been in choirs ever since then, including choral ensembles at Roberts Wesleyan College and Ithaca College."

Ms. Sadler received her Bachelor of Science degree in Music Education from Roberts Wesleyan College in Rochester, New York, and went on to receive her Masters of Music degree from Ithaca College, in Ithaca, New York. She is presently completing her Doctorate program from Ball State in Muncie, Indiana.

"I taught for four years in the public school system in New York. I did enjoy younger students, but I have to say that I enjoy teaching college students a bit more. Seeing around 300 elementary students can get a bit stressful," she said. "That's when I decided to go back and work towards my doctorate. And then I jumped at the chance to come here."





Steven Curtis Chapman's new album shows that he has more than just a few signs of life left in him. It is more than obvious that Chapman is very talented, but this album lets it all break loose

and showcases the fact that he is extremely talented.

Besides the normal singing and guitar playing, Chapman sings many of the background vocals, plays the acoustic, dobro, VG-8 and acoustic slide guitars, just to name a few.

Don't let the new "almost Clooney do" throw you off, because even though the style of the music varies a bit (leaning toward an almost grunge-rock feel), you will still hear much of the familiar.

Yes, it is pretty much the same kind of sing-along-as-loud-as-you-can,





Nampa's own CBA team is scheduled to play next winter.

Nampa's about to get stampeded. Not by horses, but by basketball players.

Along with Sweetwater Junction, the new rodeo grounds and sports arena (the Idaho Center), a Continental Basketball Association franchise team, the Idaho Stampede, is scheduled to slam into Nampa.

Investors of the entertainment complexes have arranged for a franchise team of the CBA to be centered in Nampa. This team, the Idaho Stampede, is scheduled to be formed in August and September, 1997 and to begin their first season in November, 1997, according to Gary Hunter, Chief Executive Officer of the investment team. Hunter said Stampede Head Coach Bobby Dye (former Head Coach for Boise State University's men's basketball team) and other coaching staff will begin drafting from those not picked by the NBA next fall. The coaching staff will hold tryouts for local athletes in August or



September.

The investment team, organized by Bill Ilett and consisting of nine local investors, approached the CBA about starting a franchise team in the area. The CBA agreed to the proposal and now the investment team are on a campaign to sell 3,000 season tickets to see if the Treasure Valley will support professional basketball and, "We want the CBA to see that we

are serious about the franchise," Hunter said.

The Idaho Center is scheduled to be completed by February, 1997, when Nampa will host the Idaho State girls' high school basketball championships at the new sports arena, according to organizer Peter Jackson. Just ten days after the girls' basketball championships, the arena is scheduled to host the boys' high school basketball championships. According to Jackson, plans for a Grand Opening for the sports arena are still being made.

What is the CBA?

The Continental Basketball Association is a springboard league for athletes looking for an opportunity to play for the NBA. There are currently twelve teams in the CBA, not including the Idaho Stampede. Although it's fairly small right now, it offers plenty of opportunity for community members and for athletes.

"It is a developmental league for the NBA," said investment team

Gary Hunter. "It's the equivalent of a triple-A team in baseball for basketball. It develops basketball players, and coaches for the NBA," he said.

Head Coaches George Carl of the Chicago Bulls and Phil Jackson of the Seattle Sonics both got their coaching start in the CBA. The CBA has boosted a number of players up to the NBA, including John Starks, Anthony Mason, Elliot Perry and

George McCloud.

Last season, twenty-eight CBA players were called up to the NBA, some for only a quick ten-day contract and some for a larger contract, according to NNC men's basketball head coach Ed Weidenbach.

The CBA is very similar to the NBA, especially in that they have similar rules. One way the CBA rules differ is in their play-off scoring. In order to get into the play-offs, the final score of the game is not the only score that matters, unlike in the NBA. In the CBA the highest scoring team of each quarter receives points toward the play-off standings for each of their winning quarters. "This makes the players play a lot harder because even if they're not winning, they can still get points toward the play-offs for winning a quarter," Weidenbach said.

The CBA is not just a developmental league for NBA hopefuls, however. According to Hunter, professional basketball is greatly involved in family entertainment.

There are all kinds of acts-musical, dance, audience participation

in half-time prize winning activities--during the two and a half or three hours of entertainment at a CBA game.

According to Hunter, the Idaho Stampede will provide opportunity for a wide variety of people in the surrounding communities. It's not just an economic opportunity, but it's an opportunity for families to go out together.

Most of all, the Idaho Stampede is expected to offer a growth in visibility of basketball in the community, thus raising the community's interest in NNC basketball.


"I think having this team raises the level of visibility of the sport



The CBA team will have a regular schedule in the Idaho Center. When there's not a basketball game, Jackson hopes to have the complex booked for other entertainment.





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
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Vice presidential debates focus on taxes, economy

This past Wednesday, Vice President Al Gore and Republican Vice Presidential candidate Jack Kemp squared off in Petersburg, Fl. in their only debate of the election season.

The two argued over tax policy, the economy's health, and help for America's inner cities. Jim Leher of PBS's Newshour was the mediator for the event

The night was full of statistics from both sides of the political fence. Gore came quoting the same numbers that President Bill Clinton used against Republican adversary Bob Dole in the presidential debate three days earlier. These included the creation of 10.5 million jobs, sixty percent reduction of the deficit, and a low unemployment rate. Kemp replied that the 2.5 percent annual growth rate is not enough for the country to be able to sustain jobs and wealth for the under class in America.

"Frankly, that's just not good enough for this country," Kemp stated.

The two opponents repeatedly returned to the subject of packages the two parties have created. Kemp brought forth the \$550-billion tax cut against the Clinton package of smaller cuts for education, parenting, and the capital gains tax.

The Dole package is based on cutting down the 7.5 million-word tax code into something that is to be fairer and flatter.

Heated argument arose over the Dole camp's move to end affirmative action.

Gore stated that the White House policy is to "mend it, don't end it" and that the country needs to promote diversity and harmony among all people. Gore then went on to call Kemp the "lonely voice" in the Republican Party because of Kemp's belief in the need to promote diversity and inclusiveness.

Gore claimed that Kemp changed his ideas on this issue to fit his running mate's on the ending of affirmative action. Kemp rebutted by stating he's had the same ideas and position on this since the 1970s. He stated that he is in favor of equal opportunity, not equal reward.

Kemp calls for "a new civil rights agenda" that is based on expanding access to credit, capital, job opportunities, education and ownership to all. "When people own something, they have a stake in the American dream. That's affirmative action in America," Kemp said. Gore commented that he hoped Dole would follow Kemp's lead instead of the other way on this issue.

This debate, like the previous one between Dole and Clinton, was free of political mudslinging and very civil.

The final debate of the season will be on Wednesday, October 16 between Dole and Clinton.

Afghan rebels on the defensive

Afghanistan did not see the last of violence when the Soviet Union abandoned its campaign there in 1989.

Pakistan's neighbor has recently been a host for intense violence between Islamic militants and former government forces.

In the last four years, three different groups have taken over the Afghan state, the latest being the Taliban, an Islamic force largely composed of former religious students, who now control most of Afghanistan.

The Taliban captured the Afghan capital of Kabul late last month and executed former President Najibullah.

Mullah Mohammad Rabbani, a Taliban leader, stated, "He [Najibullah] killed so many Islamic people and was against Islam and his crimes were so obvious that it had to happen. He was a communist."

The communist regime was responsible for the mistreatment and/or deaths of thousands of Afghans until Najibullah stepped down in 1992.

The Taliban have restricted freedom for women by requiring that they wear traditional Islamic headdress and banning them from educational facilities.

The UN has harshly criticized such treatment of females.

Last week, U.S. State Department Representative Nicholas Burns said, "If we continue to see policies that absolutely restrict the right of women and girls to be normal people, it will have an effect...on the ability of the international com-

and ex-President Burhanuddin Rabbani were able to regain most of the ground they lost and are closing in on Kabul.

Masood's troops took over the Taliban-held town of Jabal-os-Siraj on Saturday and struck Charikar on Sunday in its drive southward towards the capital. Thirty miles north of Kabul, the Bagram airfield also came under

fire from former government troops.

Kabal's medical facilities were flooded with civilian and military casualties.

Mosood and Burhanuddin met with rebel commander Abdul Rashid Dostum on Monday to plan further action.

Dostum's support for Masood has been limited up to this point, but sources say the two must act together if the capital is to be retaken.

In an earlier statement, one Taliban official said, "We don't know whether or not an alliance has been forged and in any case, we don't care very much because we have God on our side."

Said Jasser Naderi, one of Dostum's commanders, "This [Monday's] meeting is to decide the future--what we will do together. Working together is the only way to defend Afghanistan."

Such assistance to Afghanistan includes the World Food Program and UNICEF.

The U.S. is still cautious about going too far in alienating the Taliban state, and both sides reportedly have made efforts to establish diplomatic relations.

changed if a 300-foot-high mountain of trash, built from 20 years and 1 million tons of waste from La Coruna, falls into the Atlantic Ocean. Homes were swamped and one man was killed.

On September 10, 250 residents of O Portino were evacuated to a sports stadium in La Coruna after 100,000 tons of garbage cascaded into the coastal village. Engineers said that weaknesses in the dump's walls were the cause of the garbage avalanche.

Bulldozers and dump trucks were called in to clean up the mess but residents are reluctant to return to their home town. The stench was overpowering.

The cleanup of O Portino will take three months and cost \$20 million. The mayor of La Coruna fears the garbage dump, with its mixture of used batteries, heavy metals and other materials, might slide farther into the ocean.

Larry Craig, Idaho's Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate, is trumpeting the fact

that he is anti-nuclear waste and will do everything he can to get such waste out of Idaho.

Walt Minnick, Craig's Democratic Opponent, is making an issue out of the fact that he is anti-Nuclear Waste and will do everything he can to get such waste out of Idaho. Craig and Minnick's extreme differences on the nuclear waste issue have become the focal point of an increasingly nasty campaign. I hope you noticed the obvious sarcasm in that statement. In reality, it is hard for the average voter to figure out why this is an issue at all.

What Craig and Minnick are arguing about is not whether nuclear waste should stay, but how it should leave. Craig favors an agreement made by Governor Batt that allows Idaho to become a temporary storage site for nuclear waste, and the Government will be legally required to remove the waste in thirty years, weather a permanant site has been built or not. Craig argues that without the agreement, waste would be shipped here anyway, and could be left here permanently.

Minnick believes that the government can break Batt's agreement at any time, and supports Proposition Three, a ballot initiative which would void Batt's agreement. He believes that a permanant site in Nevada's Yucca mountain will never be built, and the waste will be left in Idaho because it has nowhere else to go.

Both candidates have a point. The agreement made by Governor Batt is a good plan, if there was a guarantee that the government will keep its side of the bargain. Unfortunately, there is no such guarantee. Proposition Three rests at the crux of this argument. Ultimately, the decision on the fate of Governor Batt's agreement rests not in the hands of the politicians, but in the hands of the people of Idaho. And if we, the people, make the wrong choice, Idahoans could be living with the effects for thousands, if not millions, of years.

Arabs to control Hebron

VB splits Western weekend






In the second half, the Duckies continued to dominate, as Wolf connected with Shane Koglin fora 25-yard score.


A defining moment was Don Beebe's amazing diving catch on the 18-yd line that was run in for a TD. Beebe ended the game with 11 receptions for 220 yds.
